Allestree Woodlands Year 7 and Year 8 Careers

AWS Careers has had a flying start this year with a number of events going on within school.

Year 7 have had a visit from Sergeant Steve Moore who is part of the Army outreach team. He spoke to them about his own career journey and career paths in the forces. He also focused on transferable skills that the pupils develop whilst in school. After Christmas they will be using an online tool called Unifrog where they can search careers and courses based upon their personal qualities and interests. They will also be learning about the local labour market and doing some work on challenging career stereotypes.

Year 8 also had the Army talk with Steve Moore. Next term they will be taking part in a careers carousel where a number of different employers from a number of sectors will present to them about their careers journey and how their future options could link to certain careers. These sessions will be engaging and interactive and were a huge hit last year.



Year 9 Careers



Year 9 have been researching careers and looking at how different subjects link to certain career paths. They have been using Unifrog to look at careers and options and have had sessions with Mrs Weightman in the LRC, making use of the resources there. In November we had the Army outreach team in who did a number of activities with our year 9 students to develop their team working and critical thinking skills. They did a number of interactive activities in groups and they all seemed to enjoy the day and get a lot out of it.



Year 10 and Year 11 CV Writing and Mock Interviews



Year 10 had a group or employers in to run workshops on how to write CVs. The employers came from many different sectors across the city and gave the students an invaluable insight into what employers expect from candidates. They talked about the dos and don'ts of CVs and interviews and gave them tips for making their CVs stand out. The students were given time to reflect upon any gaps they may have and to complete their CVs in preparation for Work Experience which will launch after Christmas.





Year 11 took part in mock interviews this week. We had 25 local employers come in who all work across the city and conduct interviews as part of their roles. The students were interviewed by an employer who then gave them verbal and written feedback that they can take with them for when they go on to their next steps. The students found the experience to be valuable and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. In the new year we will be providing them with further information about next steps. There are currently lots of opportunities in the city and students are encouraged to keep checking their Teams page for any up-to-date information.



Sixth Form Careers

In November we welcomed back three Allestree Woodlands Alumni from Rolls Royce Nuclear. They presented an assembly to all the sixth form about Rolls Royce nuclear and answered three key questions:



What do you think we make at Rolls-Royce?

What do you think we make at Rolls-Royce Submarines?

What routes do you think are available to join Rolls-Royce?

The sixth form students commented that they found the presentation very beneficial and it was useful to hear from people who had made the choices they were now about to make for their own futures. They found it valuable to hear how exciting and inspiring apprenticeships could be.

Following on from this assembly, the three presenters held a seminar with apprenticeship focussed sixth formers. They talked in greater detail about the advantages of pursuing an apprenticeship with Rolls Royce and then finished the talk off with a detailed Q&A session. This will be followed up with other opportunities to work with Rolls Royce nuclear later in the year.

Year 12 Work experience Monday 22nd May - Friday 26th May.


All students in Year 12 are going to be on work experience from Monday 22nd May - Friday 26th May. In this period there will be no Year 12 classes – each day all students will be at the workplace of their host employer.

Work experience gives students the chance to learn about what type of job they might enjoy, and develop their CV. We know it can be one of the most transformational experiences young people have during their education.

Students (and their families) should source their own work experience placements. The careers guidance and sixth form team will do its best to find placements for any students who have been unable to find their own, but because we have limited resources, we expect to only be able to help a few students. N.B. Year 12 will be using some PSE lessons in January to support their work experience applications.

7 Top tips for students when applying for work experience via email /letter

- 1. Use a straight-to-the-point subject.
- 2. Use the employer's name if you know it, or Sir/Madam if you do not.
- Paragraph 1: Introduce yourself and the school you go to.
- 4. Paragraph 2: Say a little about why you are interested in the industry; a couple of sentences is enough. This shows that you have done research and have thought carefully about where you would like to do work experience.
- Paragraph 3: Politely ask about work experience opportunities on dates you



- are able to attend. You can also ask for a meeting/phone call here too.
- 6. If you know the name of the employer, use 'Yours sincerely' and if not, use 'Yours faithfully'.
- 7. Remember to proof red ⁽²⁾ the email so there are not any mistakes

We are using Unifrog (www.unifrog.org) to manage the administration of the work experience programme – for example collecting information from the employer about their Risk Assessment and Health & Safety policy, as well as getting agreement from yourselves for the placement to go ahead.

Some important logistics:

- Students need to agree the placement with the employer first, and then students will get the ball rolling by adding the placement to their Unifrog account (they will find the Placements tool on their Unifrog homepage).
- The Unifrog system will then email the employer, the parent / guardian, and the school, to collect the necessary information and permissions. For the process to work, it is essential that students add the initial information about the placement accurately.

We wish you the best of luck with supporting your child to find a placement. Please do make use of Unifrog's guides help you.



Goalball



Clara Lane, 15, sampled goalball during an October half term holiday camp in Hereford run by national charity <u>VICTA</u>, which provides support to children and young adults who are blind or partially sighted.

"There were lots of different sports and goalball was one of the activities we did on one of the days and I really loved how anyone could get involved and it was really inclusive," said Clara.

What makes goalball so inclusive is that fully sighted players can play alongside those who are visually impaired on a level playing field because everybody has to wear eye covers so that nobody can see. Players, therefore, have to rely entirely on their other senses. Played indoors, goalball is a three-a-side team sport, in which players from opposing teams try to score a goal by 'bowling' the ball towards the other team who have to defend the ball from hitting their goal. The ball has bells inside so players can track its movement by its sound, whilst the court in professional games is marked out with tactile lines so players can feel where they are. When Clara came back to Derby from the holiday camp, she wanted to carry on playing the sport, but could not find anywhere locally which ran sessions.

"I decided to tell school about it and they managed to get Goalball UK in to do a taster session," said Clara.

Students with and without visual impairments joined in the session and it proved so popular several students wanted to do it again. Goalball UK agreed to run a <u>Goalball School Leaders</u> <u>Course</u> at the school so that staff and Clara could learn how to coach and run sessions themselves. With her coaching complete, Clara is now leading sessions at the school with the help of teaching assistant Kate Goldberg who also completed the Goalball training sessions.

"We are so proud of Clara. She has demonstrated our school's values of courage, optimism, regard and endeavour. When she realised that there were no Goalball opportunities in the city, she has been instrumental in establishing awareness and knowledge within Derby."



See Me! Project



As part of the See Me! Project a group of students from year 8 and 9 went on a back-stage tour at Derby Theatre prior to watching the production of Jekyll and Hyde. During the backstage tour the students got to meet various staff to learn about different job roles within the theatre and to see how the different aspects of a theatrical production work together to create a performance. Students from Woodlands also got to meet students from Long Eaton school who had also been taking part in the project and got to see the rap they had created being showcased on the screens at the theatre.

Lydia Martin – Ex Woodlands Student

We had the pleasure of welcoming an ex-Student Lydia Martin via Teams to talk to our year 9 students live from Germany.

Lydia has had a varied and interesting career since leaving Woodlands. She has lived and worked all over Europe, including as the Derby Envoy in Osnabrück. Lydia studied and worked with French and German and was able to explain how the skills she developed through language learning are transferable to other workplaces.

The students were able to ask and answer questions about her work abroad and career in languages. It was great to see one of our MFL alumni doing so well and she has certainly inspired our year 9 students to take GCSE languages.




Parent / Carer feedback

Once again, this autumn we invited parents and carers to feedback to us on a number of areas of school life. The basis for the majority of questions is the Parent View survey which can be accessed by families throughout the year and is used by Ofsted to gather information about parental perspectives of how the school is doing.

We take the feedback from families very seriously and it was great to see that perceptions have improved in all categories this year compared to last. The percentage of parents / carers who say that they would recommend the school has risen from 82% to 87%; we want this to be all families and we do our best to respond to your concerns when things do not always run smoothly.

Curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities



Last year (blue column), families clearly felt there was room for further improvement with our offer of clubs and activities and in terms of our contribution to the wider development of our pupils such as through careers education and our PSHE programme as well as our development of courage, optimism, regard and endeavour. We have worked hard to offer and promote more enrichment opportunities such as sports, theatre visits, clubs, competitions and tournaments, the diversity and LGBTQ groups, instrumental lessons and performances, eco-committee and many more. This newsletter celebrates many of these and almost 90% of families report feeling very happy with this offer. Our wider offer has also been strengthened significantly as we appointed a lead for careers education and guidance and, again, evidence of the great work going on is evident here in the newsletter and an increase from 57% to 71% of families being happy with this part of school provision. We will continue to work hard on this and other elements of the wider development of our young people.

How the child feels at school

We want every young person who attends Woodlands to feel happy and safe at school. Our form tutors, heads of year and safeguarding team have all worked particularly hard on this area of school life to ensure that students know who they can turn to if they have a worry or concern. Ratings in this area have continued to improve as more parents and carers are confident that their child is happy with 86% of families saying this is the case now and 89% stating their child feels safe. We also undertake regular student surveys and meet with focus groups to understand the causes of any worries that pupils may have. Pupils have told us that they find the corridors busy and bustling and that this can be quite overwhelming for some. As a result, we have introduced new systems to make it easier for staff to keep these communal spaces orderly as well as recent assemblies, led by Mr Roe, to outline clear expectation of how we want students to conduct themselves when moving between lessons and at breaks. We have already noted a marked improvement and will continue to monitor as well as asking student for their views on how this is impacting their daily school lives.
