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

WELCOME

We have had an excellent start to the new academic year with good attendance and great attitudes to learning displayed by the vast majority of students who are ready to learn and focused on their lessons. Home learning completion is the best it has been in the past three years. An average of 1000 achievement points have been awarded every week this half term for demonstrating the CORE values. This is fabulous and we are really proud of how much effort pupils are putting into their studies and life at school. We are working with students next half term to find the best way to ensure they know how well their teachers think they are doing and how many points they have been awarded.

This academic year has also seen the launch of our Fundamental Five to set expectations for lessons and aid the establishment of consistent routines for students across all years and subjects. Students have been arriving to lessons and settling quickly to the 'Do Now' tasks and have taken these opportunities to recap previous learning and stretch their thinking further.

Alongside this, we have now filled all posts in our Student Leadership Team; next half term, all year groups will be involved in appointing representatives to form a wider school council to ensure that student views are heard. Last year's student leaders were influential in the decision to buy picnic benches for the quad area and in the installation of water dispensers around school so that bottles can be refilled.



Today sees our second Wear Red Day at Allestree Woodlands. Last year, we had an amazing show of support for taking a stand against racism and our students were honoured at a presentation at the Emirates Arsenal FC Stadium following winning entries in the national competition. Peer Mentoring



I am pleased to announce that following a rigorous application process, 39 students in Year 9 and Year 10 have has been selected to be Peer Mentors. This is a really important role in an exciting new venture at Allestree Woodlands. Our Peer Mentoring programme will be based on young people supporting one another. Following extensive training, staff will match mentors with mentees in one-on-one friendships so that they can provide guidance and support, serving as positive role models. Our programme will enable Peer Mentors to listen and support fellow pupils (mentees), helping them deal with the current challenges they may be facing and making positive decisions in school.

The training which will happen early next term is facilitated by Kidscape and will enable the mentors to:

- Recognise the benefits of a Peer Mentoring programme
- Understand what is involved in the Peer Mentoring process
- Share the key responsibilities of a Peer Mentor
- Recognise personal qualities and skills
- Have a greater awareness of safeguarding procedures
- Increased confidence to communicate and listen effectively
- Promote wellbeing and positive mental health

Following the training, the programme will run during registration twice a week once mentors and mentees have been paired. I am really excited about the programme and would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all of the Mentors on their successful applications.

Kobe: Allestree Woodlands Wellbeing Dog Headlines Derby Telegraph

A seven-month-old cockapoo called Kobe will be joining the teaching staff at a Derby school after graduating dog academy.

Kobe has just completed his Dog Mentor training, meaning he can support staff and pupils at Allestree Woodlands School in classrooms, either with mental wellbeing or with elements of the curriculum, such as improving communication skills. Kobe graduated training in time to be introduced to the school community on World Mental Health Day (Monday, October 10).

"As a school we wanted to support more pupils with mental health and so we researched what was being done with dogs in schools," she said. "Initially we thought of Kobe as a therapy dog, but actually when we found Jenny from The Dog Mentor, we realised he could support in so many other ways in classrooms as well."

Jenny Duckworth spent a day at the school training Kobe and working with staff and pupils. Following his training as a dog mentor, Kobe can now go into classrooms to help teach pupils how to behave around animals, how to manage their emotions, improve their communication skills and enhance their confidence through performing actions on command.

Jenny said she had seen more need for dog mentors in schools since Covid.

"There is a great need for additional support since Covid to help build well-being because some children have struggled since having to come back into the classroom," said Jenny. "My role is to help protect Kobe's personality and help teach not just him, but everybody working with him, how to get the best out of him."

Kobe, along with teachers and staff, received training from Jenny within the school to ensure they could safely work together for the benefit of pupils. They will also receive ongoing information and support to help with Kobe's work at Allestree Woodlands School. He will now visit the school each Thursday and Friday to support pupils, as well as coming in on other specific occasions, such as Children's Mental Health Week in February next year.

Across a series of sessions, the team are working with Year 11 on a Volunteering and Social Action project as well as sessions on Employability, Health and Wellbeing and Skills for Independent Living. Space was brought a little closer to earth for students at one Derby school as they welcomed back a former pupil now working in the space industry. To mark World Space Week 2022 Allestree Woodlands School hosted a range of events, including an assembly with former pupil Daisy Richardson. Daisy took part in CanSat, an engineering space competition, while she was studying at the school. It catapulted her career, leading to her job as a Junior Aerospace Engineer for UK based space company B2Space Greg Duffy, Assistant Headteacher at Allestree Woodlands School, has entered the school into the CanSat competition nine times. The national competition tasks pupils to design and build their own simulation of a real satellite, integrated within the volume and shape of a soft drink can.

The challenge for students is to fit all the major subsystems found in a satellite, such as power, sensors and a communication system, into this minimal volume. After building their "CanSat", teams are invited to launch events across the UK to launch them on small rockets, with their CanSats returning to Earth using a parachute designed by the students.

In 2018 and 2019, the school's team won the UK competition and went on to the European final. Daisy Richardson was a member of the 2018 winning team.

She said: "The school has helped me massively. I came to Allestree Woodlands in sixth form so I didn't know anyone and I saw one day that there was a CanSat meeting so I went along and kind of fell in to it." The team went on to win the UK competition, going on to the European finals in the Azores. "Basically, after that, opportunities flew in," said Daisy, 22. Inspired by the competition, she went on to do a degree in Physics with Astrophysics at the University of Leeds and had intended to stay on to study a masters.

However, it was her former school that continued to open doors for her.

"Mr Duffy invited me back to do lots of different things at the school, like presentations and talks about CanSat," said Daisy. "Then in 2019 I got invited to a space conference in Wales. NASA was there and I got to meet Tim Peake. I was there as part of CanSat to talk to companies about how they could support the competition. When I went back to university, I did start thinking more about space research and then I got a call from an internship programme run by the UK Space Agency so I applied and I put my CanSat competition all over my applications. That's how I got an internship with B2Space.Since the competition, Allestree Woodlands School has established a rocketry club and various special events to support STEM subjects. As part of celebrating Space Week, the school also enjoyed a virtual presentation from Matt Bothwell, an astronomer and space communicator based at the Institute of Astronomy and the Kavli Institute for Cosmology in Cambridge.

Daisy said she would encourage students to take part in all the opportunities available. "I kept saying yes to things, and that's what got me my job," she said. "I accepted any opportunity that was open to me, to do talks, take part in competitions. Since winning CanSat there are even more of those opportunities available at Allestree Woodlands so I would encourage everyone to take those opportunities."

Mr Duffy, who is already working with this year's CanSat team at the school, said: "CanSat always makes our students stand out at interview. We've placed students with Rolls Royce for degree apprenticeships, into UK space industry internships and also into university pathways. All have talked about CanSat in their applications. CanSat has sparked conversations, opened doors for students and schools, and provided opportunities to engage students who may never have seen themselves as being able to achieve in this way without the challenge."

Mr Duffy said it was fantastic to welcome back Daisy and see more pupils inspired.

"Tapping into pupils' fascination with space can be an excellent way to introduce scientific principles and inspire a love of science and it's why we celebrated World Space Week at Allestree Woodlands School," he said.









CanSat case study: Daisy Richardson

FROM SCHOOL PROJECT TO SPACE INDUSTRY CAREER: CANSAT PROPELS DAISY FORWARD

It all began with CanSat

Daisy was at sixth form at Allestree Woodlands School in Derby when she first heard about the CanSat competition.

"CanSat took about a year in total. There were six of us in a team supported by a teacher. We met at lunchtime and after school. The UK competition was in York and I think it was three days. It felt non-stop but it was really fun. We then won that UK stage and went on to the European final in the Azores."

"I did the parachute design. I made and designed the parachute for the can. There was a main parachute and we had a drone one, which was much smaller. Constructing a normal sized parachute would probably be quite difficult in itself. Constructing a parachute that's got to fit into a tin can is very difficult, because it's a tenth of the size. But we did it!"

"When I was taking part in CanSat it definitely helped my motivation in lessons at school. It gave me a why to what I was learning, as some of it I needed to be able to use immediately for CanSat. I could see how the information was going to be applied to real life."

Daisy recognises the impact that taking part in CanSat had on her university and career choice.

"The best thing to come out of it is definitely my job. My career prospects changed completely. I'm so glad they did, because I actually don't think I would have liked the super academic environment that I was looking at going into. I also think one of the good things is the skills that came out of CanSat and the knowledge of what a mission is actually like; I don't think you really get that in any other work experience. When you're working in the space industry, and you don't have any engineering experience, I think having that mission and planning experience is really useful."

Increased confidence

"The confidence it gave me was massive. I remember not knowing how I could contribute and then I ended up being the sole person working on the parachute. It makes you realise you CAN do it!"

"It's made me more confident in saying yes to opportunities. Now I say yes to things that I wouldn't have done before and it has opened doors for me."















A career in the space industry

Since competing in the CanSat competition, Daisy has completed a degree in physics and joined B2Space through their internship programme.

"Now I work for B2Space. Our mission is to send high altitude balloons to allow us to launch rockets from a high altitude. It reduces the cost of small companies and businesses launching payloads to space as it's much cheaper. Universities use it for research too. I did an internship with them and ended up loving it so much that I stayed!"

For Daisy, CanSat hasn't just given her the motivation to find a job in the UK space industry: it also increased her knowledge and gave her a network of contacts to encourage her in her career.

"CanSat just made me want to do it even more. I became so focused on getting a job in the space industry. I use the skills learned during the project every day, even some of the knowledge! My career prospects changed completely from taking part. I gained real connections within the UK Space Agency which really helped when it came to applying to university and getting a job afterwards."

Encouraging girls in STEM

Daisy has fond memories of the CanSat experience and continues to advocate for more girls to take part in teams across the UK, as well as encouraging girls to consider a STEM and space career.

"I go back into schools to encourage younger girls to consider this career too. I'm not a very stereotypical person who might do a physics degree and work as a rocket scientist. But I'm really passionate and dedicated to my chosen career. I want more girls to know they can do it too and see that this is what a girl in STEM looks like! CanSat was part of that journey for me and I'm so glad school were taking part."

"It is a great feeling knowing that I'm actually encouraging other girls into it now and breaking the sterotype."





Widening participation

Daisy also recognises the benefits to her school:

"It has been really good for my school too. Now they have a rocketry club and they do a summer school for new year sevens which includes mini space projects.

They have made incredible connections with Rolls Royce as well, who are based just down the road. That has been great for supporting students with work experience."












Dr Matt Rothwell, Research Astronomer

We were delighted to welcome Dr Matt Bothwell, Research Astronomer and Science Communicator at the Institute of Astronomy at the University of Cambridge, who gave a presentation (over Teams) to students from various year groups during World Space Week in early October. Dr Bothwell outlined how we can only



see 1 % of the universe with the naked eye, and how our ability to record the other 99 % with modern telescope technology allows us to deepen our understanding of it in very exciting ways. In particular, he mentioned the potential discoveries that the recently launched James Webb telescope could make from imaging deeper space with infrared radiation, the same radiation used in our toasters to make our morning breakfast! Dr Bothwell also gave a brief overview of his own area of research into very young (baby!) galaxies. It was a fascinating talk and sparked a wide range of questions from the audience afterwards. The school would like to thank Dr Bothwell for taking time to talk to our students.


Yorkshire Sculpture Park
